CERT Training

CERT Crowd and Traffic Management Class offered by the Safety Center will again be offered on November 6 & 7th (both days am only) Sign up on website “SantaCruzCountyCERT.org”.

Continuing Education Classes on zoom having good attendance. Map Your Neighborhood Workshop and Activation classes are filled but will be recorded and placed on the website under Training.

Activation

Thank you all for your participation the past three weeks. CERTs proved to be a valuable resource for the County. Estimates are at over 2000 hours of CERTs participation. CERTs were acknowledged as professional and able to respond to the needs quickly with teamwork and skill.

Those in attendance reflected on their participation in the activation. The CERTs activity included traffic, donation and communication assistance at the County Fairgrounds for the evacuation shelter, managing the RV side of the 7th Day Adventists Shelter, COVID-19 screening at the Fire Resource Recover Center, going door-door providing fire mitigation and go bag information in Santa Cruz, establishing and answering calls at the CalFire call center, radio communication assistance for animal rescue, water distribution for the mountain communities, and participation at the EOC. These were County and 3 Branch activations.

What went well

- CERTs training program was validated. Were able to be flexible and had experience, skills to adapt, and a willingness to do whatever was necessary
- Sized-up scene and kept things organized
- Helped humanized a system for communicating in an incident and caring for evacuees
- Leads friendly and welcoming gave good verbal briefings
- Radios made a big difference
- Knowing ICS was important, as well as emphasis on team and self-care
- Understood COVID-19 procedures
- Disaster psychology played an important role
- Working in pairs, critical
- Operation at RRC email updates to Leads and Team very useful

What may CERTs do better

- Need for activation kit with forms, PPE, hand sanitizer, clipboards, pens pencils, and extra radios
- Remembering to sign-in and out for protection
- Better knowledge of volunteers and their personal skills
- Improved call-out process
- More CERTs trained in Traffic Management

- Work with NextDoor/FEMA
- Continuing Education in areas such as: Crisis Intervention, expanded Disaster Psychology, Answering Calls in a Disaster, Spontaneous Volunteer Training, Evacuation Shelter Training, Situational Awareness, and Team Lead Training,
- Building team camaraderie, CERTs know team members before activation
- CERT structure and training focused on individual and neighborhood emergency response now include changes to better prepare CERTs for regional and community emergencies recently experienced (wildfire and pandemic)
- Keep shifts shorter no more than 5 hours including training times
- More emphasis on ability to do contract tracing by documenting people who are at a specific site for later use, if necessary
- More written instructions for reference
- Better recognition of COVID-19 precautions—especially distancing
- Communicate that CERTs are volunteers

Delivered in the community by a team of first responders and other qualified volunteers, this course is the foundation of the program.




Train-the-Trainer:

Hazard-Specific Training

Additional training modules allow communities to provide more in-depth training on the hazards they are most likely to face.
